At the start of term, I wrote to you all to share the fantastic news of the outcome of our Section 5 Ofsted inspection, where Carleton was rated a 'Good' school. The journey from special measures to good in 12 months is something that rarely happens in the education world, and I am so proud that our school has achieved so much in such a short space of time. Our journey so far has been incredible and I am excited by what lies ahead for Carleton High School in 2020.

In addition to this the 2019 GCSE results were 'record breaking', with students achieving above national in all key headline measures. Since this time, we have received further information that lets us know we are ranked in the top 25% schools in the country for progress. We are also one of the highest performing secondary schools in the Wakefield authority and one of the most improved schools in the country! Thanks must go to all our incredible staff who push themselves to the limit, and live by our motto 'whatever it takes' to make sure every student achieves their best. It was an amazing team effort!

I am pleased to share that these achievements have not gone unrecognised, I was delighted to receive a letter from the Rt Hon David Curry and the former Secretary of State for Education, Lord Blunkett, asking Carleton High School to be featured in the prestigious Parliamentary Review. This annual publication recognises the very best in educational excellence up and down the country and it was an honour to be asked to be featured in it.

In addition to this, I received a personal letter from Her Majesty's Chief Inspector, Amanda Spielman, who congratulated us on our most recent Ofsted inspection. It was great that she took the time to recognise the dedication of all involved stating 'the progress your school has made is the result of hard work and commitment on the part of many people' and 'the progress made by you and your team will benefit every pupil at the school'. Thanks Amanda, I couldn't agree more!

In other news, we have packed a great deal of activity into our first term here at Carleton and students and staff have created some magical moments. From our fantastic 'Open Evening' attended by a record breaking number of prospective students and their families, to our truly amazing Christmas Craft fair organised by our PTFA, we are justifiably proud of every member of our school community.

Our students in particular have worked fantastically well again this term, and continue to be great ambassadors for the school and the town. They provide endless enthusiasm, energy, humour and commitment. On the subject of positivity, since September, we have awarded a staggering 46,907 Epraise points (that's an average of 50 per student), with the school's top performer. Annie Wortley accumulating a staggering 120 Epraise points. Well done Annie.

I must congratulate our Year 7 boys rugby team who have qualified for the National

Cup competition for the first time in five years! Well done lads!

Finally, I continue to be impressed by the incredible generosity of our school community. On Monday, 2 December we launched our very own 'Random Acts of Christmas Kindness Advent Calendar' and we have certainly made the world a little kinder this Christmas. We have received an overwhelming number of donations to the Pontefract Food Bank and the Yorkshire Children's Trust Christmas present appeal. In addition, there has been an incredible amount of support for our Year 7 sponsored Santa Dash to help raise funds for our chosen charity, The Salvation Army. Thank you to everyone who has donated to these worthy causes.

THE HISTORY OF CARLETON HIGH SCHOOL

As most of you are aware, I am local to the area having been brought up in Knottingley all my life. What you may not know, is my Dad, back in the day, actually attended Carleton High School when it was known as 'Pontefract Boys Secondary Modern'. So with that said, I thought it would be interesting to learn more about the history of Carleton High School and share a flavour of this in our newsletter.

In around 1906, before there was a school, the Pontefract Union erected children's cottage homes at Carleton which could accommodate 120 children. These homes were located on Moor Lane and comprised two double cottages, an infants' nursery, and an administrative building referred to as 'Top Home' where the matron had her quarters and older children lived. Whilst at the homes, the boys would attend the St Michael's church at the end of the road for lessons in between work they completed at the home.

Prior to becoming Carleton High School, the site was home to Pontefract Boys Secondary Modern. One of the last Headmasters here was called Joe Lynch. Following Mr Lynch, the first Headteacher of Carleton High School was Bryn Haworth. He oversaw the education of thousands of pupils of Pontefract spanning three decades up until 1986, including female students who attended the school from the mid 1970s. He was nicknamed 'Batman' by pupils because he often wore his scholar's gown around the school.

The photo below was taken in July 1978 when Pontefract Boys Secondary Modern closed down before reopening in the following September as what we now know as Carleton High School.



Reverend Wright, originally from Castleford, followed in the footsteps of Mr Haworth and came to the school from a headship in Eastmoor, Wakefield in 1987. He was often known to come out and play rugby at break and lunch, Reverend Wright was also known for impassioned speeches to students in assemblies.

In more recent times, one of the most significant events in Carleton's history was the fire in October 2008. Overnight, a huge raging inferno completely destroyed the main central building of the school, including the famed bridge linking to the teaching block. Teaching spaces across the community were organised, using The King's School, Pontefract Racecourse and Carleton Grange to house lessons for all year groups. The use of porta-cabins became a long standing feature at Carleton as the site rebuilt from the ashes of the fire. As with all new builds, it took longer than expected, but the £13 million new facilities including theatre, library, dining facilities, classrooms, and sports facilities, are still the envy of many schools.

Thanks to our very own CHS historian, Mr Snowden, for putting together this flavour of some of the history of Carleton High School.


