

Excellence



INNOVATIVE USE OF TECHNOLOGY



As the term has progressed, students and staff have become ever more expert in using online technologies to make sure that even with the interruptions of Covid self-isolation, learning can still happen. Every lesson where a student is self-isolating is accessible live from Google Classroom, and even though students are at home, they can still get that all important teacher face, voice and instruction that you just can't get from working from a booklet alone. It's also been useful when staff have had to self-isolate, and have taught classes live from home, with a little help from our cover supervisors in the room. Only occasionally have the computers said 'NO!' A huge thank you and well done is due to staff, students, parents and carers for being determined to make this work, and make learning the priority.

MANCHESTER METROPOLITAN UNIVERSITY TUTORING

Pontefract Academies Trust has formed a partnership with Manchester Metropolitan University to offer specialist online tutoring to children at Carleton High School. Specialists in the fields of English, Maths, Science, Geography, History, Social Sciences, French and Spanish are working on a short but intensive programme with a range of Year 8, Year 9 and Year 10 students. Our intention is that students go from being good to great in these subjects, as research has shown that this style of tutoring, three students in a group and for three hours in a week, is some of the most effective. The tutors have been thoroughly impressed with our students' maturity and enthusiasm, as they've really grabbed this opportunity with both hands. A special well done to Year 10 who are completing two hours of this tutoring after school, showing true commitment and determination to strive for excellence.

TALKING THE TALK

We've taken the opportunity this year to really push our student's standards of excellence in speaking, but just like anything, we all need a little training at times. To support this, each week in form time, students have been learning, developing and practising their oracy skills. For all students the goal is to be able to speak confidently and eloquently in any situation. Year 7 started with some induction activities to help build confidence in speaking and getting to know each other in those first few weeks. Years 8 and 9 have also been building on their independent and group communication skills. Year 10 have started to work on speaking in more formal environments, such as in interviews – sixth form college applications are approaching fast!

It's been a joy to listen to students develop their oracy skills every week, and we look forward to these sessions continuing throughout the academic year. Every student needs a voice – we're so pleased these sessions are helping every student find theirs.


